We continue to be grateful for your commitment and your investment. Now more than ever, we need your advocacy.





Our Super Hero Squad helps children in foster care and those in jeopardy of being removed from their family by providing the foundational development of healing, safety and opportunities they need to thrive in family settings. Through counseling, health care, life skills, academic support, employment training, cultural enrichment and the like, you help them find their place in the world.

## THANKS TO THE SUPER HERO SQUAD, HERE ARE A FEW EXAMPLES OF OUR MANY SUCCESSES:

- Jasmine made honor roll.
- Tyler saw the Lion King on Broadway. That was his first time experiencing any type of cultural enrichment.
- Kesha, an 18 year old girl with developmental disabilities in our group home learned to tie her shoes and prepare simple meals – this is a really big deal!
- Kids in foster care received backpacks with school supplies to start the school year off on the right foot.

- Gerard in our group home had a successful internship at a restaurant that led to a part time job.
- 500 kids received a holiday gift that helped them feel loved and deserving.
- Paul wasn't fearful of where his next meal was coming from or where he would sleep.
- After being sexually assaulted in the work place Gabriela with support, achieved her goal of going away to college.

- All children in our new HEART program are safely with their family.
- 95 children in foster care returned home to parents or relatives.
- 5th grader school attendance increased to 92.4% in our Community Schools Resource Program.
- 92% of children in foster care were promoted to the next grade.
- 57 children were adopted.

Thanks to Abbott House I've learned a lot during these months I've been here. **Small life lessons to help with all the ones that are still coming.** I give thanks to God for keeping me strong and not breaking down into tears.

I want to thank all the staff here for allowing me to be mad, happy and have all sorts of emotions. I appreciate everything you have done for me. You were there for me when I needed you. You kept my head up, you helped me to be a better Mom.

You are super awesome. You listened. You made me laugh. You made us look pretty with your make-up supplies. You taught me tricks in Algebra. Thank you for keeping my hope up. Sometimes you were super strict, but that came in handy. I appreciate that because while it was challenging, you gave me huge life lessons. You taught me so much and very life changing. Dr. Rodriquez, I will never forget you and how you made sure me and my baby had everything we needed and you took such good care of me and my daughter.
